From All "D" to All "R"

Republicans scored a three-goal "hat trick" across the Governor's office and both houses of the State Legislature Tuesday. Republican Governor-Elect Scott Walker is already in Madison today for briefings and updates with state budget officials. Over the coming weeks, the Governor-Elect will begin announcing cabinet picks including new secretaries of Workforce Development, Commerce, and the Department of Administration, among others.

The Governor will also make a wide range of board and other appointments following inauguration on January 3, 2011. These include appointments to boards such as the Wisconsin Technical College System (WTCS) Board and the UW Board of Regents. These appointments will occur over time as current individual seats and terms come up for reappointment.

State Legislature Sees Fundamental Change

While a few races are subject to potential recounts, and all races still need to be certified, here's what we know about the new State Legislature as of November 3rd:

State Assembly

The State Assembly appears to have a new 60-38-1 split, with 60 Republicans, 38 Democrats and 1 Independent. This represents a switch in control from Democrats, who close out the 2008-10 legislature having held a 52-46-1 majority. The Republican majority is scheduled to meet on November 4th to select leaders and begin organizing. Jeff Fitzgerald, R-Horicon, is the inside favorite to become the new Assembly Speaker. The Speaker and his/her caucus leaders will then begin to select committee chairs and committee members in the weeks following initial organizational meetings.

The massive shift in power comes largely on the heels of Republican challengers unseating 10 incumbent Democrats. Among those defeated were the former Assembly Speaker, Mike Sheridan, D-Janesville, the former Chair of Assembly Colleges and Universities, Kim Hixson, D-Whitewater, and the longest serving member of the Assembly (first elected in 1970), Marlin Schneider, D-Wisconsin Rapids.

Recounts may be in store for at least 3 races, each of which has a Democratic incumbent narrowly unelected based on initial vote counts as of today: Jeff Smith, D-Eau Claire (lost by 71 votes), Kristen Dexter, D-Eau Claire (by 87 votes), and Terry Van Akkeren, D-Sheboygan (by 151 votes).

State Senate

The State Senate also shifted from Democratic to Republican control. The new Senate appears to have a 19-14 Republican majority. This follows a 2008-10 Democratic majority of 18-15. Once again, the major shift was due to an unprecedented defeat of 4 incumbent Democrats. The Democrats losing to Republican challengers were: Russ Decker, D-Weston, the former Senate Majority Leader, John Lehman, D-Racine, the former chair of the Senate Education Committee, Pat Kreitlow, D-Eau Claire, and Tim Sullivan, D-Wauwatosa.

Most observers see Senator Scott Fitzgerald, R-Juneau, ascending from minority to majority leader. Should both Jeff and Scott Fitzgerald be selected, it would mark the first time siblings controlled the two respective legislative majorities.

The Majority Matters

In addition to establishing committees, appointing committee chairs and dominating committee membership, the majority party in each house is effectively able to control how bills are worded, which bills receive hearings, and, ultimately, which measures move to the full body for a vote. A body with a large majority is typically able to move bills more smoothly because one or more members can vote against a measure sponsored by their party without risking its failure to pass. This is clearly the case with the new Assembly at 60-38-1 (50 votes being needed to pass a measure), and is at least somewhat the case with the much smaller Senate at 19-14 (17 votes being needed to pass).

Perhaps most significantly, the powerful budget-writing Joint Finance Committee will change dramatically for the upcoming state budget bill process. The JFC is comprised of 16 members with 8 from each house. The majority party fills 6 seats and names its house's co-chair to share committee leadership. The minority party receives 2 seats in each house.

This means that the 2008-10 outgoing JFC (12 Democrats and 4 Republicans co-chaired by 2 Democrats) will be replaced by a JFC for 2011-13 with 12 Republicans and 4 Democrats. The Assembly and Senate majority will select 6 Republican members including a co-chair from each body. The minority leadership will select 2 Democrats from each house.

The JFC will receive an executive budget bill from Governor Walker sometime in February. The JFC then re-writes the budget as a group before it goes to each house for consideration and passage. The budget bill establishes state appropriations for the two-year biennium beginning July 1, 2011. Unlike many states and the federal government, the Wisconsin budget bill also affects substantive law. In other words, the budget bill also starts, stops and modifies state programs and state agency operations.

Impact on Technical Colleges

The Governor-Elect's and the new Legislature's priorities will become clearer as we move toward inauguration on January 3rd. Governor-Elect Walker has already stated his intention to call a special session of the Legislature for a "Job Creation" session prior to consideration of the new budget. Watch for details soon. In terms of other major initiatives affecting technical colleges, there are only a few that are highly probable at this time based on the campaign platform of then-candidate Walker.

During the campaign, the Governor-Elect regularly discussed requiring public employees in the Wisconsin Retirement System (WRS) to fund the "employee share" of pension contributions. Technical college districts, like almost all Wisconsin public employers, have traditionally made the full employee (as well as employer's) pension contribution. Requiring employees to pay their own entire employee share would effectively reduce employer

payments by some 7.2% of covered payroll and would have the effect of indirectly reducing employee wages by the same 7.2%. The Governor-Elect will undoubtedly also look at other public employee benefits. As a candidate, the Governor-Elect discussed moving all public employees to the state employee health insurance plan. While this would benefit some local governments, a number of technical college districts have current plans that are already cheaper than the state plan.

Finally, the Governor-Elect will be drafting a state budget bill that almost all inside observers believe will more directly address the state's structural deficit, estimated at \$2.7 to \$3 billion over the biennium. With a state that has much of its budget commitments tied to large and ongoing budget items (K-12, the state's share of Medicare, Corrections, etc.), other more discretionary spending is a relatively small portion of the budget. Nevertheless, this smaller slice includes state general and categorical aid to technical colleges, operation of the WTCS as a state agency, much of UW-System funding, and state-based financial aid through the Higher Education Aids Board (HEAB).

Whether in the biennium budget or introduced as stand-alone bills, there are only a few indicators of other initiatives to come. One Assembly member has already announced the intention to shape collective bargaining by prohibiting public labor contracts from naming specific insurance carriers. This appears aimed at the WEA Trust, the health insurance company affiliated with WEAC. Other bargaining and benefits-related initiatives are almost certain to follow.

In terms of predicting much more, it's always easier and safer to predict the past than the future. Without knowing what will come for certain, past bills introduced over recent sessions by then-minority Republicans may give some indication of what's to come. These include the possibility of changing district board governance by requiring elected boards. They also include a wide range of possible levy controls fashioned as levy "freeze" or revenue limit.

Following his election as Governor in 2002, Jim Doyle was presented and vetoed new local property tax limits on technical colleges on three occasions. On a larger constitutional scale, the Legislature also attempted to move a "TABOR" initiative ahead that would require in the State Constitution that any increase in taxes – including by a technical college district - be put to voters. This plan collapsed as political fortunes changed. Amending the Constitution does not involve the Governor directly but does require an identical initiative pass two successive Legislatures (e.g., in 2011-12 and in 2013-14) before sending the amendment to the populace for a vote. TABOR redux? Time will tell.

2010 State Elections in Perspective

The world of politics and governing changed in Wisconsin as profoundly as anywhere across the United States on November 2nd. Voters spoke for significant change and significant

change there will be. Of course, politics and governing are always the art of the possible, regardless of party control. The realities of the economy - and many, many other factors - affect and complicate what is possible as much as they will drive with momentum what will happen in Madison for the new budget bill and session. Nevertheless, we have never seen political change of this magnitude, at least in modern times. The last time Wisconsin saw a state-level “trifecta” was 1938. A new Governor means entirely new leadership of state agencies and new leaders on state-level boards over time.

No matter who each reader of this report voted for, and whether you cried tears of joy or pain as yesterday’s votes were tallied, there is another profound change afoot distinct from the Democratic-to-Republican earthquake. Fully 24% of the State Senate is brand new (8 of 33 members) and an extraordinary 29% of the State Assembly (29 of 99 members) are newly elected. This will not only be a Republican session, it will also be a session with an historically large freshman class.

Madison College Voters Say “YES!”

In a major vote of support, MATC Madison District voters dramatically approved an historic \$134 million referendum on November 2nd. This is the largest referendum measure in technical college history and is among the largest, if not the single largest, in state history across all of local government. The referendum will allow Madison College, among other projects, to build a new health sciences building, to remodel, expand and upgrade the main Madison Truax Campus, and to provide significant upgrades and expanded capacity at each district campus, including the major new Madison West Campus. The preliminary vote totals reflect a stunning 59-41% vote in favor. The vote total reported this morning is: 153,481 “yes” to 104,937 “no.”

This achievement reflects enormous effort by the college and its leadership. It also reflects a public willing to invest in technical colleges during economically challenging times characterized by widely anti-tax and anti-public spending voter sentiment. We are proud of and congratulate Madison College on this historic vote!
